



# PACE Report

#### Public Outreach

In 2023, we hosted a Bleeding Disorder Awareness Month campaign with State Advocacy Days in Columbia. We held a kickoff for the Red Tie Campaign with city and county proclamations recognizing March as national Bleeding Disorders Awareness Month. We held a World Hemophilia Day event, hosted our Men's & Women's Retreat, hosted a STEP for Bleeding Disorders fundraiser (that was open to the public), and held our annual Par for the Clot Charity Golf Tournament. We advocated in Washington, DC and exhibited at the South Carolina School Nurses Conference.



#### Advocacy

In 2023, ten BDASC members participated in NBDFs Annual Washington Days for meetings with the offices of both South Carolina U.S. Senators and five of the seven members of the House of Representatives. We held our Annual State Advocacy Days with 33 legislative meetings. We held out annual legislative breakfast for all members of the general assembly. We advocated to secure several Co-Sponsors on H.3618.



#### Community Connections

In 2023, we continued to develop our support groups including our MENS., CA.R.E. (women's), WVD and Rare Bleeding Disorders support groups, as well as continued our teen programming. We held myriad meetings, programs, and activities for each of these groups throughout the year. We also continued our Virtual Innovations Program (VIP), utilizing iPads to keep members connected virtually and informed about ongoing BDASC



#### Education

BDASC hosted a number of educational events this year including our Annual Meeting and H.E.L.L.O. Conference, a Medical Symposium, a Fall Advocacy Summin and Winterfact Gathering, and also had the privilege to attend, present, and be honored at three national conferences. We hosted 16 Educational Outreach Programs with more than 400 members in attendance throughout the year.
